Competitions

As the Winter 24/25 season starts, Club Captain Simon F, takes an this opportunity to remind readers of some of the rules around competitions.

The below guide is abbreviated, with the full rules available on the NSRA website. Each competition organiser may have additional rules, but all base them on the NSRA rules.

Definitions:

Target: The aiming mark

Card: The sheet with one or more targets on it

- Cards must be shot in round order and you can shoot as far ahead of the
 round due date as you like. It is good practice to get ahead of the due dates in
 case of illness, business trips etc. Extensions to the round due dates are
 sometimes possible but only with good reason. 'I forgot' is not an acceptable
 reason.
- Where a card has on it fewer than the required number of shots, any missing shot(s) shall be deemed a miss unless the witness can certify of their own knowledge that a shot was fired in error on the target of another shooter.
- Where a card has on it more than the required number of shots, the scorer shall score the appropriate number of shots with the lowest value. A penalty of one point will be deducted for each excess shot.
 - As an example, we had a LSR shooter who should have shot 6 cards, with 5 shots on each card. However, the shooter put ten shots on each card. So, only the lowest 5 shots on each card counted and then 5 penalty points were deducted on each card.
- Where there is more than one card per round (e.g. LSR, the Eley competition), all cards for a round must be shot on the same day. (The only exception to this are the NSRA combined Standing and Kneeling and 3P competitions).
- All competition cards must be signed by the shooter immediately after shooting.
- The witness checks that the shooter has signed the cards and then adds their own signature and date to the cards.
- It is the responsibility of the shooter to then check that the witness has signed and dated all cards. (In one extreme case, a card was received with no shots on it at all, that had been signed by both the shooter and the witness).
- It is very helpful to those marking cards if members trim their cards before
 putting them in the box. The rules require all trim lines to be visible on the
 card. If you accidentally cut the trim line off, please attach it to the card with
 either sticky tape or staples before placing it in the box.

As mentioned, the above is only an abbreviated guide. A full guide will be made available on the SPRC Member's website.

Benchrest shooting

In the latest of our shooting guides, Don explores Benchrest shooting.

Benchrest target shooting is rapidly becoming a very popular discipline, both at the club and the wider shooting community. As well as being popular in itself, it has the advantage of being very accessible to those who are no longer able to lie down with a rifle (prone shooting), stand with a rifle (LSR/Gallery), or lift a rifle/pistol in any of the standing or kneeling shooting disciplines.

Benchrest is shot at 20 or 25 yards with the shooter seated behind the rifle, which is itself supported either by a single rest on a table in front of the shooter, or by the shooter using a sling, but not both. Any standard bolt action, LSR or air rifle in .22 may be used, but we recommend using a bolt action or air rifle due to the extremely exacting targets used. We also recommend the use of a riflescope. A specific variant of the standard 10 bull outward gauging target is used.

Whilst using a rifle that is supported at its front and rear may seem almost too easy, the target used is very exacting and the regulations are very precise as to what is and what is not allowed in terms of how the shooter may support the rifle. We do recommend that all benchrest shooters review these rules as they are required for all competitions and are rigorously enforced at all external competitions to ensure fairness.

The club has an excellent selection of suitable rifles, tables and rests, and we find that the better the ammunition used, the higher the scores achieved. Our better benchrest shooters all find that the more precise/accurate makes of ammunition give real benefits in terms of their scores.
